TOOLS FOR SAVING \$

veryone's budget has gone up to pay for rising utility costs. What can you do about it? This is the main question being discussed at this year's Southern CT Condo Trade Show on November 3, 2007 in Stamford.

There are many tools and techniques to combat energy use and save money. Our company has focused on several areas to fight back against these costs.

Electricity Savings: Start small, replace your common area light bulbs with florescent bulbs. Convert conventional bulbs to compact florescent bulbs. They last longer which lowers your maintenance costs and they consume less energy. For additional savings, check your water heater. When it comes time to replace your water heater make sure to look at high efficiency units and research online water heaters which do not use electricity to keep a tank of water hot – instead it heats it as needed.

Water Savings: Water conservation saves you money on two budget line items. First, it saves money charged by the water company and second many towns have a sewer use charge or tax which is based on your water meter reading. Lower your water consumption and lower the sewer charge as well. You can purchase water conservation kits which include 1) aerators for faucets; 2) conservation shower heads; and 3) toilet tank displacement so you use less water per flush. The association could distribute kits to all unit owners to reduce the community bill. For example, the U.S. mandated maximum water flow for a shower head is 2.5 gallons per minute. One of the lowest flow shower heads and cheapest is the Niagara Conservation Earth Massage Soap & Soak (\$20) and uses about 0.5 gallons per minute. Another way to save is if you have common bathrooms you may consider upgrading to high efficiency toilets that use less water per flush.

Heat & A/C Savings: Heating and air conditioning use a lot of energy. Some simple steps can save you big money. First make sure to set up a schedule for changing the unit's filters (two or four times per year) – a clogged filter will cause the unit to run inefficiently and use more electricity. Second, swap out your regular thermostats for a programmable digital thermostat which will save you approximately 10%. To save money on air conditioning, put an aluminum coating on your flat roof to reflect the sun – this will save approximately 10-15%. If you have a roof top HVAC unit, check to see if it has an economizer. Economizers bring in cool air from outside during the night to cool down the building without running the costly AC. Lastly, if your unit needs costly repairs and it may be time for replacement, order a high efficiency unit with a SEER rating of 13 or 14.

Utility Savings: You can minimize the effects of fluctuating costs of heating oil, gas and electric. You can lock in pricing for a year so the price does not "float" with the market. You can also talk to suppliers about a price cap to see if they offer you to float below a set price but not go above the determined price cap. Lastly, ask what time of year is the best time to shop for these items when the prices are lower to save the most. For example usually spring is the best time to start calling and asking about heating oil.

Finally, the State of Connecticut offers tax incentives for purchasing high efficiency equipment – ask your vendors for info to save even more!
